We extend our special thanks to Board member Joe Yanta, who has asked the Board to explore and implement the following initiatives with funding from Bishop John W. Yanta's estate:

- A Bishop Yanta Scholarship program from the Polish Heritage Center for Catholic descendants of Polish immigrants to Texas who attend Texas colleges or universities, are practicing Catholics, and who are participating in an active Polish club or organization.
- Providing transportation for pilgrimages from other Polish communities to Panna Maria, including a tour of the Polish Heritage Center.
- Promoting and supporting Polish language classes for staff.
- Support of marketing programs to get the word out to increase visitors to the Center and to keep the website relevant and vibrant.

Bishop Yanta always wanted to make sure that the Center and its exhibits were up to date and of high quality, so updates to and maintenance of Exhibits and Technology are other needs. The Board has approved recommendations for implementing these initiatives from Executive Director Alice Poore.

Our thanks to Board member John Cebrowski for including promotion of the Polish Heritage Center on his recent trip to Poland where he met with representatives of the IPN, the Institute for Polish Remembrance, and the Wspólnota Polska for possible capital project opportunities.

We have immense gratitude for the continuing support of the Polish Consulate in Houston for our efforts, and for including the PHC in their celebration of the 233rd Anniversary of Polish Constitution Day. The event featured a fascinating talk by Consul General Monika Sobczak about Poland's example of constitutional democracy and the struggles Poland faced throughout the years to return to a constitutional democracy. Following was a concert featuring Dominika Dancewicz (Violin) and Andrew Schneider (organ) in an outstanding musical performance which received a standing ovation. The event ended with an excellent reception. It was a wonderful Polish cultural experience, and a lovely follow-up to our Duo Klavitarre concert at the PHC.



| Meeting with Region 20 Social Studies

PHC's Educational Outreach Program has taken the next step in expanding our student tours to school districts in South Texas. Ana Villareal Simpson, a consultant, and the Social Studies TIL Coach for Region 20 Educational Service Center, recently contacted me to host their Spring Social Studies Leadership Forum.

Regional District Social Studies Coordinators from eight districts - Boerne ISD, Northeast ISD, East Central ISD, Northside ISD, Stockdale ISD, Fort Sam Houston ISD, Harlandale ISD and South San ISD - attended the forum. One of the responsibilities of these district coordinators is to investigate opportunities to enhance the educational experience of their students. So, of course we wanted them to see exactly what their students would see at the Center.

The meeting began with a brief history of Bishop Yanta, his vision, and how the Polish Heritage Center came into being. They then watched the documentary that tells the fascinating story of the first Polish immigrants to Panna Maria and the establishment of the oldest Polish settlement in the United States. Next, the staff walked them through the same agenda as the students follow. Each was given an audio wand as they toured the Gallery, so they could listen to the exhibits that caught their interest. They experienced the "Name that Artifact" game in the Cestohowa exhibit, and just like with our students, there were a few items that baffled them.

Board member and tour guide Sam Kotara walked them over to the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church and pointed out significant aspects within the church. The coordinators were told the beautiful story of the immigrants holding Midnight Mass under the old oak tree to give thanks for the blessing of their safe arrival. Next was a visit to nearby Saint Joseph's, the first Polish school established in America, and these educators had the opportunity to explore all the items collected over the years by the Panna Maria Historical Society. After that, they returned to Bishop Yanta's Room for refreshments and the opportunity to create a traditional poppy flower from tissue paper. Our education specialist, Susie Kotara, led them through the design and explained the significance of the flower to the Polish culture.

At the end of the session, the coordinators were given an example of the Social Studies curriculum the PHC will provide to their teachers as they schedule their trips to the Center. This curriculum is a weeklong collection of activities that address Polish history, immigration, traditions, and culture and literature. This Social Studies Leadership Forum turned out to be a wonderful experience for these coordinators who expressed how they could not wait to share with their district teachers the unique beauty of the Center, how the depiction of the Polish immigration to Texas is so expertly done, and that the Polish Heritage Center is truly a national treasure.
